#### PISANG GEN ALFA: Smartphone Application for Mental Health Families of Alpha Generation in Indonesia



#### **Abstract**

Families with alpha generation in the industrial era 4.0 have problems in mental health care, however, effortare made to prevent the occurrence through health education. The prevention model in the industrial revolution era 4.0 used a mobile application on a smart phone. PISANG GEN ALFA is a smartphone application that contains the method of parenting, assertive care, and stress management. The aim of this study is to develop PISANG GEN ALFA as an application for reducing mental health problems in families with alpha generation. The application was developed through two stages, the first was carried out by creating application content and sophisticated systems by technology experts. Furthermore, in the second stage, a perception test was performed in the fields of mental, pediatric, and maternity nursing. Then, 100 families with alpha generation children were assessed in Malang Regency, East Java, Indonesia using a learning media questionnaire, and Intraclass Correlation Coefficients (ICC) test. The application consists of Education menu about PISANG GEN ALFA, parenting in industrial revolution era 4.0, stress prevention and management, assertive care, and parenting tension. The statistical analysis showed the value of 0.875, while the average of 3 assessors was 0.964> 0.5 (high stability). Furthermore, from the diligence results, 86.78% of the families stated that the application was very suitable for use, while 13.22% commented that it was feasible. PISANG GEN ALFA was a health education application used for families with alpha generation children in reducing mental health problems during parenting.

### Effect of Intradialytic Exercise on Hemodialysis Adequacy, Depression and Quality of Life in Hemodialysis Patients

#### **Abstract**

Although hemodialysis therapy continues to advance, the mortality rates is still a major issue in the treatment of hemodialysis patients. There are two independent predictors associated with this mortality, namely hemodialysis adequacy and depression. Intradialytic exercise has potential effect in term of dialysis outcome and quality of life. This study aims to determine the effect of intradialytic exercise on hemodialysis adequacy, depression and quality of life in hemodialysis patients. A quasi-experimental study was utilized in this study. A total of 60 hemodialysis patients were enrolled and assigned randomly into exercise (n = 30) and control groups (n = 30). During four weeks, patients in the exercises group participated in 30 min/day, two times a week intradialytic exercise. All patients underwent measurement of adequacy using Kt/V, depression using Beck Depression Inventory II and quality of life using Kidney Disease Quality of Life at the baseline and four weeks thereafter. After four weeks of intradialytic exercise, the intervention group showed a significant reduction in depression (p = 0.001) and a significant improvement in Kt/V (p = 0.003). This study also found an increase mean score in MHC after four weeks intervention. Intradialytic exercises can improve hemodialysis adequacy and reduce depression in hemodialysis patients. This intervention also safe and there are no reports of side effect of this exercises.

#### Abstract

The increase of multinational and multicultural studies' required researchers adapting the original instrument to be used in other language mostly in non-speaking English population. Content validity is needed to ensure the content of each item of translated instrument represents the variable of interest. Content validity as a part of instrument adaptation process should be conducted before conducting other type of validity. The Jefferson Scale of Empathy - Health Profession Students (JSE-HPS) has been widely used to examine health profession students' self-reported empathy levels who involved in patient care in a clinical setting. However the JSE-HPS of Bahasa Indonesia version is not existed yet to be used in a study in Indonesia. This study aimed to evaluate the content validity of the translated JSE-HPS to assess empathy level on nursing students. Instrument translation was conducted initially through forward translation and backward translation. Ten experts of senior nursing faculty members from several nursing institutions reviewed the instrument of its relevance and clarity. The content validity was scored by content validity index including item content validity index (I-CVI) and scale content validity index (S-CVI). The content validity was also assessed by universal agreement (S-CVI/UA) and average agreement (S-CVI/Ave). In addition, Kappa was conducted to provide information about the degree of agreement beyond change. The result of S-CVI/UA and S-CVI/UA were 0.950 and 0.995, respectively. I-CVI and Kappa reached similar score that was 0.975. Based on the CVI and Kappa calculations, The Jefferson Scale of Empathy - Health Profession Students (JSE-HPS) in Bahasa Indonesia version reached acceptable value to be valid to assess empathy level for the Indonesian nursing students.

### The Effect of Coping Strategy Education on Student's Academic Stress at SMP Negeri 1Singaraja



#### **Abstract**

Changes in the learning process during the COVID-19 pandemic caused students to experience academic stress. Academic stress is a condition in which students suffer from physiological, psychological, cognitive, and social disorders as a result of academic demands. Appropriate coping strategies would help students in dealing with academic stress. Coping strategies could help in the process of adjustment and problem solving to conditions that cause academic stress. One way that could be done in improving coping strategies is by providing education on coping strategies for academic stress experienced by students. This study aimed to determine the effect of coping strategy education on students' academic stress during the COVID-19 pandemic at SMP Negeri 1 Singaraja. This type of research is pre-experimental with a one-group pretestposttest design. The sample was selected using a simple random sampling technique from 7thgrade students at SMP Negeri 1 Singaraja based on inclusion and exclusion criteria totaling 40 people. Based on the results of the Wilcoxon test, the value of p= 0.000 (p < 0.05) indicated that there was a significant effect of coping strategy education on students' academic stress during the COVID-19 pandemic at SMP Negeri 1 Singaraja. Providing education on coping strategies through lecture discussion, mentoring, and distributing booklets could be used as a means to assist students in dealing with academic stress so that students would be able to have good coping with the academic stress.

## Promoting Children's Perception and Attitude Toward Sexuality and Sexual Abuse Prevention Through "Dylan Snake Ladder" Game-Based Education in Bantul, Yogyakarta

#### Abstract

Child Sexual Abuse was a global problem widespread in many cities in Indonesia. Komisi Perlindungan Anak Indonesia or Indonesian Children Protection Commission (KPAI) recorded as many as 1.880 children become victims of sexual abuse such as rape, fornication, sodomy, and pedophilia. Around 67% of these child sexual abuses occurred in school-age during elementary school. This problem can be prevented by promoting awareness and attitude regarding sexuality and by increasing skills in preventing sexual abuse among children in elementary school. To prevent sexual abuse and improve sexual consciousness, sexual education which less formality and considering children's preferences in playing is needed. The purpose of this study was to investigate the effects of Game-based education ("Dylan" snake ladder) on promoting children's perception and attitude toward sexuality and preventing sexual violence against children. This is a quantitative study with a quasi-experimental pretest-posttest design with the control group. This study was conducted between June-October 2021 in one elementary school in Bantul, Yogyakarta. The participant of this study was 90 elementary school children aged 6-12 years. The experimental group (45 participants) received one session of education using "Dylan" snake and ladder education media, while the control group didn't receive any sexual education. The outcome was measured using a questionnaire and was analyzed. The experimental group showed significantly better sexual perception and attitude than the control group. The mean score between experimental groups statistically increased after the intervention (mean 88,3 to 91,4) with a p-value of 0,03. They experience a better attitude particularly on maintaining reproductive organs and preventing sexual violence by protecting their intimate body, refusing stranger invitations, and fighting against the sexual perpetrator. The "Dylan Snake Ladder" game-based education has a significant impact on sexual perception and attitude and sexual abuse prevention activities.
